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A LOOK @ NOVEMBER'S BALLOT

Analysis & Commentary on the November Ballot

I have chosen to use the Voter Information Guide for the brief analysis of the propositions and the one referendum on the ballot. What follows is some commentary on the merits of the supporters and opponents of each proposition. However, "Proposition" one is the water bond issue. The quick analysis of the bond is my own. - Jack Murray, LWVVC -

➤ 2014 Water Bond ◀

The water bond is seeking \$7.12 billion for water supply infrastructure including public water system improvements, surface and ground water storage, drinking water protection, water recycling and new water treatment technology. This proposition has traveled a rather tortuous path. First offered by the legislature as an \$11.14 package in 2010, it was withdrawn because its passage looked doubtful. Offered again in 2012, it suffered the same fate. The new legislation was started as a \$6 billion package and was finally placed on the ballot as the \$7.12 billion proposition.

The governor and his allies have done a good job pushing the reduced package with both parties in favor; business has joined and many labor groups. This, by the way, includes the League of Women Voters. Opponents appear to be primarily sportsmen and fishing groups. To demonstrate the differences in support, as of September 17 supporters had raised just under a million dollars, the opponents less than \$38 thousand. Opponents say this is driven by the drought and is just a special interest money grab. Proponents see this as a necessary investment in California's future and have the momentum to succeed. Governor Brown's current popularity is also significant.

➤ Proposition 2 - Rainy Day Budget Stabilization Fund ◀

Proposition 2 amends the State Constitution to end the existing rules for a state budget reserve and replaces it with new rules. The new rules would change how the state pays down debt and saves money in reserves. In addition, a new law would go into effect that sets the maximum budget reserves school districts can keep at the local level in some future years. Finally, the proposition places in the Constitution an existing requirement for the Governor's budget staff to estimate future state General Fund revenues and spending.

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The key changes under Proposition 2 will be to require the state to spend a minimum amount each year to pay down specific debts. It changes the amount that goes into a budget reserve account, increases the maximum size of the account, changes the rules for when the state can put money into the reserve, and changes the rules for taking money out of reserves. In addition to avoid conflict with existing laws, it creates a state reserve for schools and community colleges and sets maximum reserves that school districts can keep at the local level in some future years.

There is no real opposition other than "2 Bad for Kids" which seems to be long on words and no financial support. As of September 17 those in favor of the proposition have raised over \$1.1 million and the opposition nothing. This is sorely needed legislation to stabilize the state's budget and accelerate the state's debt payments. It is doubtful there will be much opposition.

➤ Proposition 45 - Public Notice Required for Insurance Company Rates ◀

This measure requires the Insurance Commissioner to approve rates for certain types of health insurance. The rate approval process would be similar to a process that is currently used for other types of insurance, such as automobile and homeowner insurance.

This measure applies to individual and small group insurance, which cover about 6 million Californians. It requires changes in health insurance to be approved by the Insurance Commissioner, provides for public notice and hearing for rate changes, requires sworn statements by health insurers as to the accuracy of rate information, and prohibits policy eligibility based on prior coverage or credit history.

The proponents are an assortment of public service organizations and unions. The opponents are primarily the medical profession. Those opposed have nearly 40 million in campaign cash, those that support just under \$5 million. The state press is generally opposed because Covered California and the national health insurance program, has been a success in California. It should be given a chance to succeed and improve before another layer of government regulation is proposed. In addition public support has been slipping and would seem to predict failure at the polls.

➤ Proposition 46 - Medical Malpractice Lawsuits Cap and Drug Testing of Doctors ◀

This measure has several provisions that relate to provider conduct and patient safety. Specifically, the measures primary provisions relate to medical malpractice, prescription drug monitoring, and alcohol and drug testing for physicians.

While there is some merit in increasing malpractice awards this proposition has been promoting the drug and alcohol testing of physicians. This would be the first such statute in the US. Based on the numbers it does not seem to be critical issue. It would seem that this is an issue for the legislature. This appears to be doubly true when one looks are the list of supporters and opponents. On one side are attorneys, on the other side doctors. There is no public interest represented.

➤ Proposition 47 - Reduced Penalties for Some Crimes ◀

This measure reduces penalties for certain offenders convicted of non serious and nonviolent property and drug crimes. The measure also allows certain offenders who have been previously convicted of such crimes to apply for reduced sentences. In addition, the measure requires that any state savings that result from the measure be spent to support truancy prevention, mental health and substance abuse treatments, and victim services.

The fiscal impact of these changes could have net state criminal justice savings that could reach the low hundreds of million dollars annually; at the local level justice system savings could reach several hundred million dollars annually. While the effort to support the legislation, \$3 million dollars vs. \$17 thousand dollars as of September 8, seems to indicate strong support, law enforcement officials are generally opposed. The support is a reaction to the very tough on crime wave that swept the state in the past. Unfortunately, this measure is not well drafted. In spite of that, a change needs to be made and now is the time.

➤ Referendum - Indian Gaming Compacts ◀

Under the State Constitution, enacted legislation can be placed before voters as a referendum to determine whether it can go into effect. If approved this proposition would allow AB 277, the tribal compacts with North Fork and Wiyor and the memorandum of understandings between the tribe and various governmental agencies, to go into effect. In this case AB 277 allows an Indian casino to be built off reservation land in a more desirable location, the first time such a move has been permitted. The measure has been approved by all the required officials, including Governor Brown.

There are seven Indian casinos in the Central Valley. While this casino would be well sited near Madera and Highway 99, it would appear to be in competition with the other tribal casinos. Would other tribes seek non tribal land locations to

enhance their share of the gaming dollar? On the other hand, the economies of North Fork and Wiyor should be improved. While approval is more a matter of liking or disliking modern gaming, it is hard to ignore an effort to improve a group's economic welfare. Either a vote for or against is justified.

WATER 101



Jeff Pratt, Director of Ventura County Public Works Agency, Addresses LWVVC Membership Meeting

September 13th Address by Jeff Pratt, Ventura County Director of Public Works

Jeff Pratt provided League members and guests a comprehensive tutorial on the county's water resources. Providing something like a survey course over an hour and a half, he reviewed the water resources of the county, using illustrated maps to help viewers connect the dots and understand the differences that exist within the county. Each topic was worthy of more in depth study, but weaving the pieces together allowed us to see the big picture. Under the title "Overview of Water Resources," he reviewed the topics of Watersheds and the Hydrological Cycle, Supply, Distribution, Uses and Current Issues.

We gained a better appreciation of the different water issues in the county which depend on each watershed and groundwater

basin as well as its supply options – whether the relevant agency can import water from the state system or MWD (the Metropolitan Water District), or pump groundwater and how much. Depending on the source, the cost of water varies dramatically and can be as much as \$1,200 per acre foot. That is too expensive for agricultural use so farmers try to dig wells ever deeper when necessary. There are 178 water retailers in the county – cities, special districts, water companies, and private wells -- located in various parts of the county-- and all differ.

Most water is used in agriculture and for residences, the most of which is for landscaping. This so far is the driest year on record. Record keeping goes back to the 1800's. Hence all retailers are urging reduced usage.

Groundwater monitoring and the issues at Fox Canyon Groundwater Management Agency were explored, along with the potential of new legislation to address gaps in monitoring and reporting. The quality of groundwater has become a greater concern with sea water intrusion and brackish water in recharge areas. An additional issue of supply is the reuse of treated water. It has not become a large source of water due to the costs involved and the need for infrastructure to add separate pipes for it. Ultimately, Mr. Pratt predicts we will be forced to treat it to potable standards to use for drinking water and public reluctance will be overcome.

Mr. Pratt also reviewed the many regulatory agencies that oversee water resources, adding complexity to reaching agreement on issues requiring change as well as conflicts among those with competing objectives. The well-known environmental issue of taking measures to protect fish also affects our local water resources and reduces supply.

This was a most informative presentation and encouraged us to continue to learn more as we all attempt to reduce our water consumption and study options for the future, including becoming more informed about the water bond proposition on the November ballot.

As LWVVC recruits new members we thought now might be a good time to dedicate space in the next few issues of the VOTER to including definitions of some of the lingo used by the LWV. For help we turned to a publication put out by LWVC entitled “League Lingo: a Glossary of Terms and Definitions.” Here are this month’s terms, understanding them will help you understand the League:

Concurrence (this one’s important) – Substantial member agreement reached through group discussion based on information presented by a study committee or through other methods of member response. Members are asked to concur, or agree with, a statement *rather than* to answer a question as with consensus. A concurrence statement may be a position held by another League or a decision statement recommended by a League board or study committee. The statement must be approved or rejected as written.

Consensus (so’s this one) – Substantial member agreement preferably reached through group discussion. Consensus is the sense of the group rather than a majority opinion. Discussion is based on information prepared by a study committee and is guided by consensus questions.

Consensus Questions – Specific questions prepared by a study committee to stimulate interaction, focus discussion and facilitate conclusions by the group. Questions vary in style from open-ended to multiple choice. Questions are approved by the appropriate League board.
